



Eligibility – Victim Assistance

The following entities are eligible to apply:



State governments

All U.S. states, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands are eligible to receive an annual VOCA Victim Assistance grant. Applicants must meet the eligibility requirements specified in VOCA, 34 U.S.C. § 20103(a).

Applicants must be state victim assistance programs that are eligible to administer VOCA Victim Assistance grants. Note: For purposes of this program, the term "state" includes the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and any other possession or territory of the United States. 34 U.S.C. § 20102(d)(4).

Program Description

Under this NOFO, OVC will award each eligible state and territory victim assistance program an annual grant to support eligible crime victim assistance programs in that state or territory. Eligible crime victim assistance programs are those that are "operated by a public agency or nonprofit organization, or a combination of such agencies or organizations or of both such agencies and organizations, and provide services to victims of crime," and that meet the other requirements set out in 34 U.S.C. § 20103(a)(2).




Program Description (cont.)

The vast majority of **victim assistance** funding goes to local direct service programs, including children's advocacy centers, domestic violence shelters, rape crisis centers, human trafficking and elder abuse programs, civil legal services, crime victims' rights enforcement, and victim assistance positions in prosecutors' offices and law enforcement departments.



Goal, Objectives, and Deliverables

The goal of the **VOCA Victims Assistance** funding is to improve the treatment of victims of crime by providing victims with the assistance, support, and services necessary to aid their restoration after a criminal act, and to support and aid them as they move through the criminal justice process.





Unallowable Use of Funds

The activities listed below are out of the program scope and will not be funded.

- 1. Any program or activity that, directly or indirectly, violates (or promotes or facilitates the violation of) federal immigration law (including 8 U.S.C. § 1373) or impedes or hinders the enforcement of federal immigration law—including by failing to comply with 8 U.S.C. § 1373, give access to DHS agents, or honor DHS requests and provide requested notice to DHS agents.
- 2. Any program or activity that violates any applicable Federal civil rights or nondiscrimination law. This includes violations that (1) indirectly violate the law, including by promoting or facilitating violations, or (2) unlawfully favor individuals in any race or protected group, including on a majority or minority, or privileged or unprivileged, basis, within a given area, population, or sector.

Elements That Victim Assistance Applications MUST Include

These elements **MUST** be included in the VOCA Formula application submission:

- OJP Financial Management and Grant Administration Training Certificates
- A Statement Regarding Use of Administrative and Training Funds
- Civil Rights Compliance Reporting
- Monitoring of Subawards
- Statement Regarding Plan To Subgrant Funds

Program Description

State and territory victim compensation programs, funded by **VOCA Victim Compensation Formula Grant** awards, supplement state and territory efforts to offset victims' financial burdens resulting from crime. Compensation is vital to victims who face enormous financial setbacks from medical fees, lost income, dependent care, funeral expenses, relocation expenses, and other costs.



Goal, Objectives, and Deliverables

The goal of the **VOCA Victim Compensation Program** is to supplement state and territory efforts to provide financial compensation to crime victims throughout the Nation for costs resulting from crime. These funds are used to provide crime victims with the compensation, support, and services necessary to aid their restoration after criminal violence, including costs associated with medical fees, lost income, dependent care, funeral expenses, relocation expenses, and other costs.



Unallowable Use of Funds

The activities listed below are out of the program scope and will not be funded.

- 1. Any program or activity that, directly or indirectly, violates (or promotes or facilitates the violation of) federal immigration law (including 8 U.S.C. § 1373) or impedes or hinders the enforcement of federal immigration law—including by failing to comply with 8 U.S.C. § 1373, give access to DHS agents, or honor DHS requests and provide requested notice to DHS agents.
- 2. Any program or activity that, directly or indirectly, violates (or promotes or facilitates the violation of) any applicable Federal civil rights or nondiscrimination law (e.g., by unlawfully favoring or disfavoring individuals in any race or group on the basis that it is (or is not) a majority or minority (or privileged or unprivileged) race or group in a given area or population or sector), including in any program or activity having any component relating to diversity, equity, or inclusion.

Elements That Victim Compensation Applications MUST Include

These elements **MUST** be included in the VOCA Formula application submission:

- OJP Financial Management and Grant Administration Training Certificates
- A Statement Regarding Use of Administrative and Training Funds*
- State Law Governing the Crime Victim Compensation Programs

Type of Award – Both

Awards will be made as **grants**:

- Legal instrument of financial assistance
- Awarding agency maintains an oversight and monitoring role
- Without substantial involvement with awarding agency

Proposal Narrative Format - Both

- The proposal narrative must
 - be double-spaced.
 - use a standard 12-point font.
 - have no less than 1-inch margins.
 - NOT exceed 10 numbered pages.
 - be submitted as an attachment in JustGrants.
 - Provide a general description of your program (history, structure, etc.).



Both Applications Should Also Include

Along with the required documents, the following information should be included in the application submission:

- Standard Application Information (SF-424 info from Grants.gov)
- Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (if applicable)
- Financial Management and System of Internal Controls Questionnaire
- Disclosure of Lobbying Activities (SF-LLL)
- Applicant Disclosure of Duplication in Cost Items

- DOJ Certified Standard Assurance
- DOJ Certifications Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, Suspension and Other Responsibility Matters; Drug-Free Workplace Requirements; and Law Enforcement and Community Policing
- Applicant Disclosure and Justification—DOJ High-Risk Grantees



Application Submission Overview





Applicants have two application submission deadlines:

- 1. Grants.gov (submitting the SF-424 and SF-LLL)
- 2. JustGrants



It's OK to enter programmatic data in Grants.gov and update later in JustGrants.



A JustGrants submission should include all items as defined in the NOFO.





Additional Resources to Apply

DOJ Application Submission Checklist

Submitting an application to DOJ is a two-part process. An applicant first submits an abbreviated application in Grants.gov. The full application is then completed in JustGrants, DOJ's grants management system. The following steps and tips will assist potential applicants in completing DOJ applications.



Step 1: Confirm your Entity's System for Award Management (SAM) registration information:

- Register with SAM or confirm that your SAM registration is active and up-to-date. You must renew and validate your registration every 12 months. If you do not renew your SAM registration, it will expire. An expired registration can delay or prevent application submission in Grants.gov and JustGrants. Registration and renewal can take up to 10 business days to complete.
- On April 4, 2022, the federal government will stop using Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) numbers and start using the <u>new SAM Unique Entity Identifier (UEI)</u>.
- Entities new to JustiCrants: Confirm that the contact information (email address) for your Entity's Electronic Business Point-of-Contact (E-Bix POC) in SAM is accurate and up-to-date. The E-Bix POC is onboarded in JustiCrants as the Entity's first Entity Administrator and will receive notifications from JustiCrants. The Entity Administrator is responsible for completing Entity User orboarding in JustiCrants. Once the Entity Administrator is onboarded, that role can be reassigned to another Entity User.
- . Technical issues with SAM registration or renewal must be reported to the SAM Help Desk (Federal Service Desk).

Step 2: Apply in Grants.gov

- · Effective February 21, 2022, all Grants.gov users and applicants will need to use Login.gov credentials
- Search for an open DOJ funding opportunity in Grants.gov or on the agency website and review the solicitation requirements.
- Complete and submit the required documents in Grants.gov at least 48–72 hours prior to the Grants.gov deadline
 to allow for time to correct any problems or errors. The Grants.gov portion of your application includes the SF-424
 and SF-LLL. (Note: The user and email identified in Section 8.F of the SF-424 will be identified as the Application
 Submitter in JustGrants and will receive future notifications from JustGrants.)

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SAM.gov Entity Registration and Renewal Reminder ${\mathscr O}$

All entities seeking Department of Justice (DOJ) grant funding must have an active registration in <u>SAM.gov</u>. Once registered, entities must complete annual renewals to maintain an active status.

It is recommended that you begin the SAM.gov registration or renewal process 30 days prior to any deadlines to allow for the time necessary to complete the full process, including SAM.gov's entity validation process. If you intend to apply for a specific DOJ opportunity, refer to the Grants.gov due date provided on the solicitation, and plan your SAM.gov registration accordingly.
