Lack of safe, affordable, and barrier-free housing puts barriers for survivors. Housing resources whether it was emergency, transitional or for permanent relocation and availability of affordable rental units is a significant barrier. The most difficult aspect of not having viable housing options is telling survivors that they must remain in toxic, abusive situations because there are no safe, permanent solutions. The only local shelter was consistently at capacity and was not a reasonable accommodation for anyone with mobility or health issues. Please briefly describe efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal crime during the reporting period.

Sub-grantees report: Native American Tribal victim assistance staff provided financial assistance, such as transportation to and from federal court, crisis advocacy, accompany victims to meetings with federal prosecutors and detectives, and assisted with providing referrals and resources. Victim Assistance agency worked closely with the FBI and homeland security on a case that included ceration and distribution of pormographic material and videos. The agency involvement included conducting some of the forensic interviews as well as working with the FBI forensic interviewer and team, providing advocacy, and promise and the first of the victims and for the framilies. Sub-grantes report that their organizations could not offer competitive salaries and could not provide sufficient benefits within their labor market. They also report that the heavy staff workload contributed to stress and vicarious trauma suffered by victim service professionals. These impacts are directly related to funding available to victim services programs. These stressors will only increase if funding from the federal crime victims fund do not fully support victim assistance services.
