^{1.} Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

For Q3 2020, the CVCB received 57 applications. This is down from 81 during the same reporting period in 2019 but is still in line with prior years figures despite the COVID-19 pandemic.

^{2.} The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The average processing time for Q3 2020 is approximately 150 days (five months) from the date of receipt of the claim to the date of final decision awarding or denying. The claims process in Kentucky is as follows: all incoming applications are entered into the database and correspondence sent to the Claimant; claim is assigned to an investigator; an investigation into the claim is conducted; all claims are assigned to a Board Member upon the completion of an investigation; Board Members issue a recommendation on the claim awarding or denying; the full Board meets and issues a final decision on a claim after the issuance of the recommendation.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The COVID-19 pandemic initially caused worry in Kentucky regarding whether the CVC program would continue to possess sufficient funds to meet victims needs. However, while a hit to our financial position is expected and will be impactful, such impact does not appear to be as bad as initially feared.

^{5.} Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

There were no cases involving federal victims that were reviewed and decided by Kentucky during the reporting period. However, Kentucky has a very good working relationship with the Federal Bureau of Investigation offices based out of both Louisville and Lexington and will make full use of that relationship when a federal victim files for CVC benefits.

^{6.} Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

No notable processes were implemented to improve the claims process in Kentucky during the reporting period. The processes that were put in place prior to Q3 2020 are continuing to reduce Kentucky s average processing time on claims, thereby increasing efficiency and efficacy of services to victims.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

Kentucky has not utilized VOCA assistance funds to assist with victim compensation during the reporting period.

^{8.} Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

The former Kentucky Claims Commission was abolished by Governor Beshear via executive order and all three areas that were under the purview of the KCC were merged into the Office of Claims and Appeals effective September 1, 2020. Insufficient time has currently passed to indicate the impact of this reorganization on victim compensation.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Kentucky has conducted trainings with prosecutors, victim advocates, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and other allied professionals to discuss victim compensation claims process, statutory provisions, decision making, etc. Relationships were established or strengthened with allied organizations in an attempt to reduce barriers so victims are ultimately served more effectively
