No significant changes for regular applications. There was a 20% due to COVID19 during third quarter but increased 20% in fourth quarter with net difference of 21 applications from pervious FFY.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Claimants may file applications for crime victim compensation online or on paper with the Ohio Attorney General s Office. Claims examiners in the Crime Victim Services Section receive new applications on a daily basis and assign each a claim number. The following procedure is used to process each claim: * An economic loss investigator and field investigator are assigned to simultaneously investigate the claim. * The claims examiner and economic loss investigator send correspondence to the applicant and service providers requesting information needed to verify the applicant s expenses and calculate economic loss. This includes documentation of expenses incurred and documentation of collateral source benefits such as insurance. * Field investigators send requests to law enforcement for documentation needed to determine eligibility for compensation. This includes the police report, the coroner s report if applicable, suspect information, and the applicant s criminal history information. They also check with prosecutors to verify evidence held, court dates, and any restitution ordered and paid by the offender. * The economic loss and field investigators have 120 days from receipt of the application to complete their investigations. Investigators follow up by telephone and through correspondence to obtain all of the needed documentation. The processing time can be extended if necessary, but the office goal is to complete review of the claim prior to the 120-day deadline whenever possible. An economic loss supervisor checks all claims whether a zero claim or an award claim. They make sure the expense calculations are accurate and detailed. * An Assistant Attorney General reviews the information gathered by the investigators and issues a Finding of Fact and Decision of the Attorney General regarding whether the applicant is eligible for an award. * If the applicant disagrees with the Finding of Fact and Decision, the applicant may request reconsideration within 30 days. A different Assistant Attorney General will then re-assess the initial determination and issue a Final Decision within 60 days. * The Final Decision of the Attorney General s Office may be further appealed to the Ohio Court of Claims. A decision by a judge of the Court of Claims is final.

The section works with advocates from the U.S. Attorney's office to assist victims with filing applications for compensation.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

During this reporting period the Attorney General s Office added upgraded features to the Matrix claims management system to make it easier for victims to apply for compensation in a fully electronic format. Claimants can currently use this new, online portal for the following functions: * File initial and supplemental applications * Register for online access to existing claims that were previously filed on paper * Receive correspondence from Attorney General staff *Send messages to Attorney General staff * Submit electronic copies of documents Implementation of the new portal has increased access for victims to the compensation program, especially in light of challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. The online portal is not impacted by delays in paper correspondence or limited access to libraries and other resources. Overall victims have been receptive to the new system, and the office will continue developing its features into the next reporting period.

7. Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

No administrative funds are used from the grants. All grant funds are used to pay claims.

^{8.} Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There are no new initiatives, policy changes, or legislation for this reporting period.

^{9.} Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Each year our office holds meetings, trainings and conferences to help victim advocates and law enforcement agencies. Only one Finding the Words training was held during this reporting period. Training was held on 10-1 thru 10-5-2019 with 27 participants attending each course. Due to COVID19, the spring training was canceled. This is an intensive five-day forensic interviewing course using practice guidelines from the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children (APSAC) and Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) outlined in the bulletin. Two Days In May Conference on Victim Assistance was changed to a virtual one-day training due to COVID19. The One Day In May was held virtually on 5-21-20 with 705 people in attendance. The 2020 conference marked the 29th year holding the event. The virtual conference highlighted the work of trauma recovery centers and provided results from national research around victimization rates for those attending. Awards were presented that recognized service providers who were doing exemplary work to address the needs of victims. The Linking Systems of Care for Ohio s Youth Research Symposium was rescheduled and offed as a virtual training series: Bridging Research to Practice was held in September 2020. There were seven 1-hour presentations that highlighted promising partnerships to allow services providers to let research inform victim service provision. An average of 100 participants attended each presentation. Ohio is one of four demonstration sites in the United States that received the Linking Systems of Care funding from the US Department of Justice-Office of Victims of Crime (OVC). OVC wishes to facilitate and improve efforts to bring healthcare, child welfare, justice, and other systems together, and to coordinate and align these efforts to ensure a timely and seamless response to young victims, their families, and caregivers, no matter the system of entry. The duration of the entire demonstration project is up to five (5) years, depending on funding. During this period, Ohio transitioned from the Planning Phase of the project that includes a Needs Assessment/Gap Analysis, Resource Mapping, Screening Tool Development, and Strategic Plan Construction, to the Implementation Phase. The goal of the Linking Systems of Care for Ohio s Children and Youth project is to improve responses to child and youth victims and their families by providing consistent, coordinated responses that address the full presenting issues and full range of victims needs. The project is guided through three principles: Healing Individuals, Families and Communities; Linked Systems of Care; and Informed Decision Making http://www.linkingsystemsofcare.org/about/guiding-principles.html, (National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges, 2018).

^{10.} Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The Attorney General s Office has continued its public outreach efforts during this reporting period. Staff members with various job responsibilities volunteer their time away from their usual duties to assist with outreach. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the office has limited in-person travel but still conducts outreach presentations in virtual format to assist our community partners with understanding the compensation program and encouraging victims to apply. Several of these webinar presentations have been able to accommodate more attendees than if the training had been conducted in person. Some examples of outreach presentations during this reporting period include: * Professional training at the Ohio Domestic Violence Network s Domestic Violence Advocacy Fundamentals regional courses * Multiple presentations for office staff and hotline/hospital volunteers at Women Helping Women (domestic violence and sexual assault services organization) * "Lunch and Learn" at the Survivor Advocacy Outreach Program of Southeast Ohio (rape crisis services organization) * Telephone conferences with funeral directors and management/legal staff at Foundations for Families (community advocacy organization)

Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 2743.69 requires Ohio Attorney General s Office to provide an annual update on the Ohio Victims of Crime Compensation Fund under sections 2743.51 to 2743.72 to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the minority leaders of both houses.

^{12.} Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.

Continue to perfect the new portal system in the Matrix claims management system making it easier for victims to update their claims, and check the status of the claims from the onset to the decisions. Continue to perfect the ways we can track all claims where subrogation is possible due to convictions pending at the time of our decisions. Claims can be triggered for follow up investigations into the criminal trials of the offenders, thus increasing our subrogation revenue. Legislative changes to eliminate public record requests for all crime victim claims, thus protecting all victim and claimant s personal information from the offender or other predators. Legislative changes or federal grants issued specifically for relocation fees for domestic violence victims and all victims who need to relocate immediately to be safe from offenders. Victims can request publication from our office on line. Publications includes: Crime Victim Right s Booklet, Crime Can be Costly palm cards (also in Spanish), VINE brochures, Applications and Resource Guides. We also provide translation of 20 different languages thru Language Line Services.
