NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

During this reporting period the Oregon Crime Victims Compensation Program saw a 14% decrease in the number of applications submitted by Oregon crime victims and their family members. During the third and fourth quarters (04/01/20-09/30/20) the number of claims received drastically dropped as compared to last year. We believe this is most likely due to the COVID pandemic.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Explain the responsibilities of your office in processing a claim: Once an application for compensation is received by the department it is assigned a claim number and a claims specialist requests the required documentation from various agencies such as law enforcement, Child Protective Services and child assessment centers. The specialist also sends requests for information to employers and medical providers. Additional information may be obtained through the Oregon Judicial Department's on line court system, such as protective orders or criminal indictments. Once all the required documentation is in the claim file, the claim is moved to the claims examiner for review and determination. The claims examiners review the documentation in the claim file in order to determine whether the claimant meets the statutory eligibility criteria for receiving funds through the program. If the claim is accepted the examiner will send a Determination Order and Notice to the claimant advising them that their claim has been approved. If the claim does not meet the statutory eligibility criteria, the examiner will write a Determination Order and Notice of Denial explaining why the claim has been denied and siting the applicable statutes and rules. In most cases claim determinations are made within 90 days or less. Once a claim is accepted, any bills in the file will be reviewed to ensure that are directly related to the criminal incident. If all required documentation is included with the bill (EOB, chart notes), the bill will be paid. Many claims come in without any information to make a determination which means the majority of the wait time is waiting for the claim to have all required documents to make a determination.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The major issue during the second half of this FFY was COVID and providing services to our victims while working from home and taking care of our families. The program also saw an increase in mental health and crisis calls over the last eight months due to COVID. This resulted in staff not only assisting with compensation payments and determinations, but also referring callers to various other services through out the state at a higher rate than in the past. One other issue the compensation program has experienced this FFY, (third and fourth quarters) was difficulty in obtaining police reports due to COVID, protesters and riots. There have been significant delays in the receipt of police report from some of the law enforcement agencies in the Portland Metro area.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The Program has had an exceptional working relationship with the Oregon FBI victim specialists and the Oregon US Attorney's Office victim specialists for several years. If the compensation program receives an application that indicates a federal crime has been committed CVSSD staff will contact the victim advocates at the US attorney's office or the FBI for information regarding the criminal case. In most instances, there will not be a report available, however the Oregon Program, together with the FBI victim specialists, created a submission form years ago that is filled out by the investigating agent(s) and then forwarded to our office in order for the claims examiner to make a determination regarding eligibility. The advocates with the US Attorney's office and the FBI are excellent resources for victims of federal crimes in Oregon and they make every effort to contact CVC staff prior to assisting in the submission of an application.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

Victims continue to be able to submit their applications on line which means the program receives those applications within minutes of submission. The Program has continued to make improvements on the portal in order to make applying for assistance intuitive and convenient for victims. The program also launched our new on-line compensation training. The timing of the on-line training was fortuitous as it came at a time when it was greatly needed due to COVID. With the on-line training the program was able to train advocates and medical providers without in person contact. The on-line training is available to new advocates who have been unable to attend one of CVSSD's quarterly compensation trainings and seasoned advocates who might need a fresher regarding the program. The on-line training serves as a tool to help advocates navigate the compensation program rules and statutory requirements in order to better assist the victims and survivors they work with.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

The Oregon program utilizes VOCA Administrative funds in a few ways. VOCA administrative funds are used to pay a portion of four compensation staff salaries as well as personal services and benefits, rent and uniform security and a very small portion on office supplies. The program usually uses some of these funds for staff training, however due to COVID all trainings were virtual this year and at no cost to the program.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

During this reporting period the program increased the amounts paid for sexual assault forensic exams. Beginning July 1, 2019, the Fund began to pay eligible medical services providers the costs incurred for providing sexual assault medical services to victims of sexual assault up to the following maximum amounts: \$475.00 for a medical examination plus collection of forensic evidence using the Oregon State Police SAFE Kit; \$215.00 for a medical examination without collection of forensic evidence using the Oregon State Police SAFE Kit; \$70.00 for emergency contraception \$125.00 for sexually transmitted disease prophylaxis; Up to five (5) days of HIV prophylaxis will be paid at 50% of the amount charged; \$95.00 for services provided by a Doctor of Medicine or a Doctor of Osteopathy and; Payment for all other services provided in conjunction with the sexual assault exam that is calculated using the Oregon Workers Compensation Fee Schedule. The payment of all other services was not something the program had paid in the past. As a result the payments for our sexual assault exams increased dramatically. In the last month we have submitted changes to our Administrative Rules to place a cap on the amount we will pay for "other services" at \$2000.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

The Oregon program has excellent working relationships with all of the above mentioned community partners. The Program offers education regarding the compensation program and assistance to our community partners in order to maintain strong working relationships with everyone. Up until March 2020 our VOCA Assistance team had been in the same office as VOCA Compensation so we were easily accessible to answer questions that come up regarding compensation. As all staff are now working remotely staff are not as accessible as they once were, however we are still able to contact our VOCA Assistance partners via email, telephone and Teams meetings.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

Although the compensation program has two dedicated staff who train advocates and child assessment center staff throughout the state, that came to a halt this year due to the COVID pandemic. These two staff had traveled throughout the state of Oregon visiting rural counties and communities in order to train advocates in district attorney offices, non-profits, tribal communities and child assessment centers about compensation. As a result of the inability to perform in-person trainings, the CVC now has an on-line compensation training available on the DOJ web-site.

Please list any other outcome measure(s) that are reported to the governor, legislature, or other state entity that have not been reported in this submission. Provide the actual measure(s). The data may be reported separately in your progress report.

The outcome measures to the legislature include the percent of determination made within 90 days as well as the number of SAVE exams performed by a certified SANE. The target number for exams performed by SANEs is 98% and the percent achieved was 58%. However, while DOJ administers the Sexual Assault Victims Emergency Medical Response (SAVE) Fund the SANEs are employed by health care providers; they are not DOJ personnel. The result measured by this key performance measure (KPM) is, therefore, affected directly by personnel who do not serve under the Attorney General's direction or control. The availability of SANEs is still an issue in some areas of the state, due to both geographic challenges and lack of funding for 24/7 hour coverage. The ongoing training provided by the Attorney General's Sexual Assault Task Force to certify more SANEs is a critical element contributing to this measure. The number of claims determined within 90 days target goal is 98% and the program achieved 85% during the last state fiscal reporting period.
