### NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

It continues to be difficult to measure the long-term impact COVID-19 is having on victims seeking out services and filing for Compensation. We have seen our numbers "level off" in the early fall after a temporary reduction in the number of claims received in March-June of this year. While compiling our "2020 State of the State" for our Governor's Office, we were concerned by the apparent "drop off" in claims for 2020 from 2019. However, after conducting a 3 year analysis of compensation claims, our office determined that 2020 numbers were actually tracking quite similar to 2018's numbers. 2019 seems to have been an "outlier" year.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Wyoming's procedure for processing CVC claims begins when our office receives the (paper) application. The application is date stamped and the received date is entered into the CCVC database utilized by our state. The date the claim is received is referred to as the "new date." The claim is then presented to the Claims Analyst who will review the claim for completeness and, if the claim is complete and able to be processed, the Analyst will make a decision on the eligibility of the claim. The date that eligibility is determined is referred to as the "resolution date" and a corresponding "resolution code" is entered to reflect the status of the claim (ie: Approved; Denied; or Unable to Process). If a claim is "unable to process" the claim will undergo follow up to see if there is missing information that must be obtained before the claim can be resolved as approved or denied. The Resolution Date of a claim previously identified as "unable to process" will be changed to reflect the date the claim was finally resolved as "approved" or "denied." The calculation of "processing time" measures the time between when the claim is received (New Date) and when a decision has been made on the claim (Resolution Date). The actual calculation for this reporting period was 10.59 days.

3. Does your state have a victim satisfaction survey?

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

COVID-19- Since mid-March of 2020 through the end of this reporting period (October 31, 2020), the impact of COVID-19 has been felt by the victim service community in a variety of ways. In the days immediately following the State Public Health Officer's orders and the Governor's declaration of a State of Emergency due to the pandemic, DVS funded providers scrambled to adjust. Victim Service Providers and Domestic Violence Shelters, who work with victim to submit Compensation applications, were not clearly defined as essential services and many programs tried to balance transitioning staff to work from home while maintaining services for victims; traditionally all conducted in person. Additionally, due to the quarantine, many programs were concerned by the dramatic reduction in calls for service between late March and June. This concern prompted programs to wonder if victims, perhaps quarantining at home with their abusers, were able to reach out or even knew that the programs were open. Compensation also felt this decrease in claims coming in, which is foreseeable if victims weren't making reports to law enforcement or working with victims advocates. By October 31, 2020 it was clear that the long term impacts of COVID-19 on victim services remain to be seen.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Wyoming routinely works with our US Attorney's Office Victim Assistance Coordinator as well as our state's FBI, and DHS. Wyoming has F.E. Warren Air Force Base, a large land mass Indian Reservation in our state, and a vast area of federal lands. Because of these federal areas, compensation routinely receives claims from tribal members and victims of crimes that fall under federal jurisdiction. All of our programs (across our state) are versed in assisting crime victims for both state and federal crimes.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

OIG Audit of the Compensation Program- The most significant development/impact on the Division of Victim Services (DVS) this last year was the ongoing Office of the Inspector General (OIG) audit of the Crime Victims Compensation program. The audit of Wyoming's VOCA-Compensation grants looked at five (5) federal awards from 2015 - 2019 and began in May 2019. The Final Audit Report was published in March of this year (2020). The only significant finding for the program was a calculation error in our State Certification. Due to the reporting error, DVS was over awarded federal funds each of the five years the error was repeated. Through the audit process it was determined that a single funding stream was erroneously included in the calculation of state funds used to support the Compensation program. DVS further discovered the error began when the Attorney General s Fiscal Office saw a change in the Chief Fiscal Officer. The prior CFO assumed the duty of completing the State Certification; upon her retirement this duty was transferred to the Senior Accounting Analyst. Fortunately, as a benefit of the audit, DVS has drafted detailed instructions for completing the State Certification, as well as robust policy to be followed for the future. Identifying our agency s error and being able to remedy this relatively quickly has been a significant learning experience and will strengthen the Compensation program from here on out. Painful as it may have been, understating where DVS can improve our process has been worth the angst of the audit.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

Administrative funds are used to support travel costs for our Compensation Analyst to conduct compensation training for programs upon request. Additionally, Wyoming uses administrative funds to ensure both the SAA (Division Director) and the Compensation Analyst attend national and regional compensation training conducted by NACVCB, OVC, or other federal agencies. Finally, administrative funds are used to support the ongoing maintenance for our Compensation Claims Database administered by Genoa Group.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

Female Genital Mutilation Legislation- During the 2020 Legislative Session HB-127 was successfully passed into law to address Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) in our state. The law, which criminalizes the acts involved in FGM, specifies that FGM shall be included in the definition of aggravated assault and battery. Additionally the law tasked DVS with working with the Wyoming Department of Health to develop a training program for health care professionals, law enforcement, and teachers on the signs of FGM and clarifying that FGM is a form of child abuse and falls under the state s mandatory reporting of child abuse laws. This law went into effect July 1, 2020. To date our office has not seen any claims related to this new crime. Our office has planned training to victim service provider on working with FGM victims, and with providers on recognizing the signs of FGM. The roll-out of training has been delayed due to COVID-19 restrictions and concerns with overwhelming our medical personnel while they are addressing the pandemic.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Each year our office conducts a Mandatory Meeting for all of our sub-recipient programs. This year, due to COVID-19 restrictions and precautions, the meeting was moved to a virtual format and broken up into the three (3) regions that our office administers. At this meeting programs are apprised of any innovations in victim services, or changes within our office that would affect service delivery to victims. As a component of that meeting, programs are given compensation training and guidance on eligibility and the compensation application process. Additionally, with the use of VOCA-Assistance administrative funds, our office holds an annual conference (Joint Symposium on Children and Youth- WyJSCY) where all allied professionals are given extensive training on best practices for victims. This year the WyJSCY was moved to a virtual format, but we had a record number of attendance. Again, as part of the curriculum at the conference, there is an emphasis upon and updates to crime victims compensation. Finally, every Peace Office Basic candidate in our state receives victim's compensation training delivered to them as part of their core curriculum at the Wyoming Law Enforcement Academy. The Academy training is given by the Director of the Division of Victim Services (SAA for VOCA Comp.) There was, remarkable no major disruption to the Law Enforcement training. The March training occurred March 16th which was before our state started to see COVID-19 closures and restrictions. Subsequent trainings on July 14th and September 29th were also able to be held in person with CDC recommended accommodations and precautions.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

As described above, we rely on our sub-recipients, whom we train, to conduct public outreach to victims on the availability of crime victims compensation. I believe we do a very good job of making sure victims understand the availability of crime victims compensation. By making sure all advocates, law enforcement and other allied professionals are both aware of and trained upon the crime victims compensation program, Wyoming makes great strides in improving public awareness of the program. The Division also has a Facebook page and Website hosted by the State of Wyoming where information and FAQs on Crime Victim Compensation are readily available.

PMT is the primary data source for outcome measure specifically on compensation. However, the Division of Victim Services does use the data we collect from all of our programs via all of our federal grants to compile a "state of the state" each year for our Governor. We track where (by county and program) our compensation applications come from, and thus can measure which programs are serving what victims. If we see particular counties or programs that don't seem to be submitting compensation applications, we target our training and technical assistance toward addressing any barriers that victims or the programs may be facing in filing for compensation.

Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.

As addressed last year, our office is supportive of any change in how the Compensation Formula money is calculated. Specifically a recalculation of how state funds are deducted/ and/or the percentage that is re-allocated (IE: \$0.60 / state dollar could be raised to \$0.70/ state dollar). Additionally, our state is working with OVC on the State Certification Form, and developing effective guidance to accurately complete the form. This document has been the source of issues for our office with OCFO and OIG auditors. Further, as an agency that administers both VOCA-Compensation & VOCA- Assistance, I would like to see Assistance money made available (eligible) to support more (traditionally) compensation activities.

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
