^{1.} Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

Due to COVID-19, many of our county operational units adjusted business processes to allow for remote work. In addition, many of our victim service providers limited or temporarily suspended in-person services provided to victims. This resulted in decreased outreach to victims regarding the program, resulting in a continued decrease in application submissions as compared to pre-covid.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once the application is complete and submitted to the program, the program coordinator at the county level investigates and substantiates the facts of the claim. This includes collecting any bills and obtaining a police report. Once completed the program coordinator will forward the claim to the board for consideration. Once a victim is deemed an eligible claimant by the Board, future expenses can be submitted and processed. Program rules require that a board hear a claim within 60 days of when that claim was received by the program. The board will then determine the eligibility of the claim and approve or deny any expenditures. If the claim is approved payments can be made either to the claimant or directly to service providers. If the claim is denied the claimant or victim is sent a letter via certified mail making them aware of their right to appeal that decision to the board within 30 days of having received the letter.

^{4.} Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

During this past year, despite a continuation of decrease in the overall number of applicants filing a victim compensation claim as compared to pre-covid years, operational units have not seen a corresponding decrease in the total amount of requested expenses during the period. In addition one of the main funding sources for the state's victim compensation and assistance fund was changed beginning in January of 2019. The change has resulted in a significant decrease in revenues available to the program which continued this fiscal year. In addition, temporary court closures, business closures, and lower travel due to COVID-19 impacted the fines and fees revenue collected, contributing to the decreases in revenue for the program. A positive change was the implementation of our online victim compensation application. It was rolled out to all Arizona counties by July 31, 2021. This change has increased access to the victim compensation for victims but it is too early in the implementation to determine the total effect it will have on application volume.

^{5.} Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Victim compensation program advocates at the county level work closely with federal and tribal law enforcement to coordinate access to available benefits for Federal crime victims. In addition, ACJC continues to coordinate with a state legislative subcommittee to improve access to victim compensation for families of missing and murdered indigenous women.

^{6.} Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

ACJC worked closely with county operational units to adjust processes to allow for continued operations under COVID-19 restrictions. Some of these process changes included adjusting victim compensation claim notification processes to allow for email notification under specific circumstances, adjusting public board meetings to allow for remote meeting access, providing training and technical assistance through conferencing software, providing victims the opportunity to communicate with the operational units through video conferencing when warranted, and ensuring that both telehealth and telemental health visits were covered under the victim compensation program when the visits were directly related to the crime. ACJC also rolled out training to operational units and victim compensation board members on trauma-informed care and self-care.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

VOCA administrative funds are critical for Arizona's ongoing efforts to improve victim services. The VOCA administrative funds allowed the State of Arizona to pay a portion of the salary and employee-related expenses for compensation program staff at ACJC. Because Arizona's program is decentralized, ACJC staff provides county-level compliance reviews, training, and technical assistance to ensure county programs are adhering to federal guidelines and Arizona Administrative Code related to the compensation program. Technical assistance, training, and program compliance reviews were provided to the counties during this federal fiscal year.

There were none.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

As the state administering agency for the victim compensation program in Arizona, the ACJC is able to leverage all available contacts and resources to streamline and coordinate administration of the victim compensation program across all levels of government. These efforts greatly reduce the barriers faced by victims applying for compensation benefits. The state of Arizona also has a state agency coordinating team (AZSACT). This team's mission is to collaboratively assess needs, maximize state and federal resources, support intervention and prevention activities, and improve quality services for crime victims and survivors while positively influencing policies and practices. These agencies include the Governor s Office of Youth, Faith and Family (GOYFF), the Office of the Attorney General (AGO), the Department of Health Services (DHS), the Department of Economic Security (DES), the Department of Housing (ADOH), the Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC). ACJC utilizes membership on the AZSACT to promote the Arizona Victim Compensation program and to collaborate with other agencies to reduce barriers for victims across the state who may apply for compensation benefits.

^{10.} Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

Victim compensation program staff at the state and county level continue to partner with the Arizona Attorney General's Office to provide information during the AG's victims' rights awareness trainings. These trainings are conducted across the state and reach a broad audience of victims, providers, and other social service agencies. ACJC staff also presents at the Arizona Coalition for Victim Services (ACVS) basic victim assistance academy in order to provide advocates who are new to victim services information on the victim compensation program for the state of Arizona.
