1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

The number of applications received has increased this fiscal year by approximately 10% from the last three fiscal years.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once an application is received and confirmed complete enough to process, the application is entered into our software program. Letters are sent to the Claimant, law enforcement, county attorney s offices as well as providers requesting documentation of the crime, charges filed against an offender, or documentation of the expenses related to the crime. The request to law enforcement includes a form that is completed by the law enforcement agency providing details of various eligibility requirements such as contributory misconduct, unlawful activity, and reporting timeframe. Once all of the documentation is received from law enforcement, the claimant is contacted to schedule a telephone interview. After the interview is complete, a recommendation is made to the CVC Board and the Board reviews the claim to approve or deny. The CVC Board meets once per month to review claims, and after the Board meets, letters are sent to the Claimants to notify them of the Board's decision.

COVID-19 has continued to impact our procedures, however, our Division has continued to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Our Office has continued the strong relationship with the U.S. Attorney s Office and members of the FBI. Communication has continued to be effective in obtaining the documentation we need to review and approve claims. DCVC participates in the Human Trafficking Working Group run by the U.S. Attorney s Office for the State of Kansas, in which the FBI Victim Specialists also participate.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The Division continues to cross-train staff members in order to ensure more people can answer the questions of callers. Due to the pandemic, core functions were cross-trained for preparedness reasons.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

VOCA Administrative funds were not utilized during this reporting period. Due to a software transition, funds were not needed and all VOCA funds expended during this reporting period were used for claim payments.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

Legislation was passed in 2021 that made two changes to the Kansas CVC eligibility. First, the definition of victim within the CVC statutes was expanded to include juveniles who witness a violent crime. These juveniles are eligible for mental health counseling, and may file beyond the 2 year application requirement, with a finding for good cause, until they turn 19. Additionally, victims of sexually violent offenses are eligible for mental health counseling if they file the application with CVC after 2 years, but before 10 years. Juvenile victims of a sexually violent offense are eligible to file for mental health counseling until 10 years from the date they turn 18.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Kansas CVC staff continues to have strong relationships with system-based personnel within the criminal justice system to enhance services and eliminate barriers for victims of crime. All Division staff frequently communicate with offices in the CJ system, and these key personnel frequently make suggestions to CVC and receive suggestions from CVC to enhance victims access to compensation.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

During this reporting period, approximately 491 people were trained by Kansas CVC throughout the state. All trainings this year were conducted via virtual platforms, and a wide variety of agencies received training. Of particular note, connections were made with the Kansas Department of Commerce and the Migrant Seasonal Farm Worker Outreach Specialists to discuss labor trafficking, how crime victims compensation can help trafficking victims, and other financial support for people they may come in contact with who are victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, or other crimes. This targeted outreach led to training people who do not work in the victim advocacy field/criminal justice system, but who do identify people being victimized.
