NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

- 1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.
 - a. The OCA noticed a substantial increase in the number of CVC claims filed for the period 07/01/2021 through 09/30/2021 as compared to the same period in 2020: 89 claims were received during the period of 2021 compared to 57 claims received during the period of 2020-an approximate 56% increase from 2020 levels. There are a few reasons that may help explain the increase. Firstly, the OCA has implemented and grown a robust training program that has reached 92 registered victims advocates, law enforcement officials, attorneys, and other whom work in the victims services industry from April 2021 through October 2021. Secondly, a claims process change was implemented in which additional award requests are being assigned new claim numbers rather than being incorporated into the originating claim. This allows the OCA to gain a greater and clearer understanding into just how many claims it processes that it did not have before. Thirdly, the OCA has made great strides toward electronic record keeping with case files that allows for ease of use and has helped increase claims efficiency. Fourthly, an engaged Board are returning their recommendations on filed claims to the Clerk for placement on their agendas, which has assisted in reducing claims processing times.
- 2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 184

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The average processing time to process a claim from the date that a claim is received by the Board to the date that the Board issues a final decision is averaging approximately 184.43 days for the period 07/01/2021 through 09/30/2021 as compared to 159.22 days for the same period in 2020. There is a very important reason as to why the figure is higher for this period in 2021 as compared to 2020. For the months of July and August 2021, the OCA was without a named Crime Victims Compensation Board. The figure provided for 2021 was for the special session that the CVCB called on September 24, 2021. If you expand the timeframe to the beginning (January) of 2021 and 2020, respectively, you see average processing times of 119.09 and 125.02, respectively. The drop of 5.93 days represents an approximate 4.7% decrease in processing time despite OCA going without a CVCB for two months. Upon receipt of a filed claim, the Executive Staff Advisor/Clerk enters the claim into the CVCB s electronic database, generates initiating correspondence to the Claimant, the prosecution if applicable, and to the Claimant's private attorney if applicable. The Clerk then forwards the case file to the investigator. The investigator conducts their investigation into the filed claim, which includes but is not limited to: conversations with law enforcement officials about the circumstances of the crime (whom was involved, relationships amongst involved parties, whether any conduct was exhibited by the survivor to indicate culpability in their injuries or death, etc.); verification on legal obligation of expenses submitted for compensation, outstanding balances, and payments made by survivors and insurance carriers; and obtaining missing information so as to allow the Board to have sufficient information upon which to base an award or denial. The investigator then drafts their investigative report, has the report viewed by the staff attorney, and then submits the full file to the Clerk upon assent by the staff attorney. After receiving the complete file from the investigator, the Clerk drafts a draft recommended order and after drafting assigns each case to one of the CVCB s three Board Members. The Board Member reviews the investigator s report and the draft recommended order prepared by the Clerk and indicates their recommendation to the Clerk. If the draft order is satisfactory, no edits are made. If the Board Member s recommendation differs from the draft recommended order prepared by the Clerk, the Clerk will edit the draft order to accurately reflect the Board Member's desire before serving on the Claimant, the prosecution if applicable, and the Claimant s private attorney if applicable. The Claimant is afforded fifteen days to register disagreement with the recommended order in the form of an interagency appeal or exceptions . Once the recommended order has been served, the Clerk places each claim on the Board's next available agenda for adjudication. Two weeks prior to the Board's meeting, the Clerk submits the complete docket to the full Board, which includes each Board Member s vote indication, each served Recommended Order, and each investigative report. The full CVCB then meets at its regularly scheduled or specially called meeting to adjudicate all claims on its docket. Once adjudicated, the Clerk drafts the CVCB s final orders for all claims on the docket and serves them on all appropriate parties. In the event that a claim is awarded, the Clerk submits payment requests to the PPC s Office of Administrative Services for processing through the Commonwealth s accounting system and mails checks upon receipt from OAS after processing.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The Kentucky CVCB was able to effectively meet the needs of those whom filed claims for compensation during the reporting period. The only issue that was encountered, but has subsequently been rectified, was the two month period that the program went without a board, which resulted in a minor backlog over that period. However, the backlog was eliminated within one month despite taking two months to develop.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

No additional steps were taken during the reporting period to serve victims of federal crime because strong relationships already exist between the Kentucky CVCB and both districts of the U.S. Attorney s Office along with the Federal Bureau of Investigation s Louisville branch. When a potential claim arises, representatives from both districts of the U.S. Attorney s Office and the FBI s Louisville branch will reach out to the Clerk and discuss the circumstances of the crime to determine if the CVCB may be able to provide compensation to the victim.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The Kentucky CVCB has continued to increase its training program to victim advocates, law enforcement officials, and allied professionals in the victims services and other industries in attempts to make known that crime victims compensation exists in Kentucky and what it can do to assist survivors. Changes in claims processes and increased electronic record keeping and retention have assisted in increased efficiency of the claims process.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

Not Applicable. OCA does not use VOCA Administrative funds. All received VOCA funds are directed to victim compensation payments.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There was no state-level legislation, initiatives, or policy changes in Kentucky regarding compensation during the reporting period. However, the passage of the VOCA Fix Act will certainly affect the Kentucky CVC program as time passes.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

The Executive Staff Advisor sits on several committees that work with survivors in attempts to reduce barriers to survivors whom may apply to receive crime victims compensation: the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet's Kentucky Victims Assistance Academy (KVAA) as both faculty and a member of the academy's Steering Committee, the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet's Violence Against Women Act's (VAWA) STOP Grant Implementation Committee, the Office of the Attorney General's Sexual Assault Kit Initiative's (SAKI) Task Force, and the Kentucky Association of Sexual Assault Program's (KASAP) Sexual Assault Response Team's Advisory Committee.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The Kentucky CVCB has expanded its training program to include monthly trainings on crime victims compensation with victim advocates, prosecutors, law enforcement officials, and other allied professionals whom work in the victims service industry to bring attention to the Kentucky program. There are plans currently being discussed and examined to increase the CVCB s presence in the community which are unfortunately being severely hampered due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Please list any other outcome measure(s) that are reported to the governor, legislature, or other state entity that have not been reported in this submission. Provide the actual measure(s). The data may be reported separately in your progress report.

The Kentucky CVCB does not regularly report program outcome measures to the governor, legislature, or other state entities. However, the legislature recently requested various pieces of data regarding the Kentucky CVC program and the Sexual Assault Examination Program for state fiscal years 2019-2022. Specifically, the legislature requested information regarding the expenditures of the CVCB, including a breakdown of category to which the expenditure is assigned; the number of claims filed with the Kentucky CVCB; the number of claims approved by the CVCB; the number of victims that have received compensation from the CVCB; the amount paid to victims; of the amount awarded to victims or paid on behalf of victims, whether any payments have been recovered under KRS 533.030 or through subrogation under KRS 49.460 and the amount recovered; the number of claims presented to the CVCB that were denied and the reason for denial; the amount paid from the sexual assault victim assistance fund under KRS 49.490; and funds used to provide assistance to programs under KRS 49.480 and the agencies to which the allocation was made. Two spreadsheets (CVCB Claim Statistics (FY19-22) and OCA Expenditures, Victim Pymts., Restitution (FY19-22)) that lay out the information requested will be uploaded into JustGrants along with this narrative. As to the last item – funds used to provide assistance to programs under KRS 49.480 and the agencies to which the allocation was made – CVCB has not provided assistance to such programs from FY19-22.
