Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once an application is received, it is reviewed for completeness. The application is assigned to a caseworker who enters it into our CVC system, which automatically assigns a claim number. The caseworker contacts the victim or claimant in writing if any additional information/documentation is needed to process the claim. In the course of determining eligibility, the caseworker contacts law enforcement for a copy of the police report; conducts a Medicaid check (Medicaid is considered a collateral source and our Program is a payer of last resort); contacts the prosecutor if an alleged offender s name is known (for outcome of the case and determine if restitution was ordered); contacts providers to verify actual out-of-pocket crime-related expenses (medical, funeral, counseling, loss of income/loss of support). Once the caseworker receives all of the needed information/documentation, they make a recommendation on whether to pay or deny the claim. Management reviews the file and makes the final decision on the claim s eligibility for compensation.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic court was not being held on a regular basis which lead to a decreased amount of court fees and fines that are collected for assisting victims of crime.

The culture of the victim assistance network in Missouri provide many opportunities for collaboration, networking and strategic planning for continuous improvement.

During this reporting period the CVC program has conducted 14 presentations with approximately 150 attendees. The presentations are tailored to fit the needs of the audience (law enforcement, medical/counseling providers, funeral providers, advocates, social service workers and the faith-based community). Additionally, the MO CVC has developed numerous documents to educate key stakeholders and victims on the MO CVC processes and requirements.
