#### NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

During this reporting period, we saw a significant (19%) decrease in the number of cases filed (by Crime Type). Contributors to decreasing numbers are the year anniversary of two mass casualty events, which accounted for 6% of our overall cases, and an (11%) decrease in the number of Sexual Assault Forensic Exam cases received. However, while cases decreased this year, or Financial Recovery Department hit a historical high and brought in 39% more monies than in the year prior.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once an application is received, it is entered into our (CVIS) database. Once entered requests are made for supporting documentation from law enforcement and prosecuting attorney offices. When those requests are fulfilled, the case is assigned to a Case Manager who reviews the documentation to determine eligibility based on applicable laws, rules, policies, and guidelines. If the claim is found eligible our Case Managers and Claims Examiners request the claims and records from providers. They will then contact all eligible claimant's within 30 days to assist them in accessing benefits. If the application is denied, a notice is sent via mail to the claimant along with information regarding appeal rights and instructions.

- 4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

For a portion of the year, the program dealt with the residual impacts of the COVID pandemic, its impacts on daily operations, and its ability to promptly assist victims. Additionally, the program experienced significant staff turnover. The program s two biggest trends were: decreasing cases and an increase in financial recovery efforts (restitution and subrogation).

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

We continue to work closely with the US Attorney's Office, the FBI, and tribal representatives on individual cases, ensuring victims of federal crime have access to benefits/compensation.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The State of Idaho is working on a business and technology modernization program (IRIS), which will ultimately transition the program to a fully web-based and paperless process. When implemented within the next 1-2 years, this modernization will significantly speed up the claims process for victims

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

No administrative funds were used.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There were no changes implemented over the reporting period.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Most notably the program is working closely with Idaho State Police and their SANE/SART Coordinator to reduce barriers surrounding payments for Sexual Assault Forensic Exams. The program has co-presented with the SANE/SART Coordinator in all regions of Idaho, and this has led to many meaningful exchanges regarding overall victim assistance. Furthermore, this connection has opened doors into the tribal system and increased overall knowledge shared and visibility for the program with all stakeholders and partners.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

In addition to our annual outreach plan, staff continues to participate in conferences, workgroups, task forces, and statewide coordination meetings to increase awareness of the program. We continue to hold regular meetings with business partners to ensure access and education about program benefits are up to date.

The program measures the following activities to determine effectiveness in serving victims of crime. 1. Average time to process an application from the date received: 16 days 2. Average time to authorize payment of a claim after eligibility determination: 18 days 5. Average time to authorize payment of a claim from the date of receipt of the application: 134 days 6. Contact eligible claimants within 30 days of eligibility. 7. Restitution and subrogation funds collected. 8. Customer satisfaction (CSAT) of service provided via the satisfaction survey.
