Letters are sent to requesting documentation from claimants, law enforcement, county attorney's offices and providers. Once the law enforcement reports and completed law enforcement verification forms are received, a victim is contacted requesting they schedule an interview with our office. Once the telephone interview is complete, a recommendation is made to the CVC Board for them to review at their monthly meeting. The CVC Board makes all determinations for claims to be approved or denied. After the Board meets, letters are sent to the Claimants to notify them of the Board's decision.

Kansas CVC changed software programs during this reporting period, and that has impacted processes in the office. Staff continue to process claims and enter payments throughout the ongoing transition.

Our Office has continued its strong partnership with the U.S. Attorney's Office and members of the FBI. Communication continues to be effective in obtaining the information we need to review and approve claims. Victim /Witness Coordinators and Victim Advocates at these agencies frequently contact our office with questions, and refer victims to our program.

Our office continues to cross-train staff members in order to ensure more people can answer the questions of callers.

No VOCA Administrative funds were used. All VOCA funds expended during this reporting period were used for claim payments.

## <sup>8.</sup> Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

Legislation was passed in 2022 that increased caps for particular expenses. Funeral expenses were increased from \$5000 to \$7500, this marks the first increase since 1998 for this expense. Crime Scene clean-up was increased from \$1000 to \$2500 for the first time since it was added as an allowable expense in 2007. Additionally, the definition of crime scene cleanup was expanding from removal costs only, to include replacement of materials that were biohazardous or damaged during evidence collection. Lastly, the \$100 economic loss minimum was struck from the statute. These increases in caps will enhance the financial assistance available for victims of crime, and allow CVCB to assist with more costs associated with crime scene cleanup. This legislation went into effect July 1, 2022 and is applicable to all claims received on or after that date.

Kansas CVC staff continue to have effective relationships with system-based personnel within the Kansas criminal justice system to enhance services and reduce barriers to victims who may apply for compensation. All Division staff frequently communicate with offices in the CJ system and communicate suggestions back and forth to enhance victim access.

During this reporting period, approximately 521 people were trained b Kansas CVC throughout the state. Outreach this year was conducted both virtually and in-person for a variety of organizations including victim advocacy organizations, the Kansas Academy for Victim Assistance, Prosecutor's offices, nurses, and legal support staff.
