NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation received 8,721 compensation claims and 5,734 sexual battery forensic examination claims during FFY 2022-23, which collectively is 3.85% less than the prior year therefore not representing any significant change.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The process begins when a Victim Compensation Claim Form is submitted to the Bureau of Victim Compensation. The form is data entered into the system used to manage compensation claims, assigned a number, and reviewed by a trained Claims Analyst to determine if the eligibility criterion pursuant to law is met. If the form is not accompanied by acceptable documentation to substantiate the request for compensation, correspondences are generated to seek supporting documentation. If the claim is determined eligible, compensable expenses submitted with the application are addressed, and/or the victim/applicant is notified to submit additional compensable expenses for payment consideration.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation continued to promote the availability of funding to domestic violence and rape crisis centers for allowable ancillary relocation costs through existing VOCA-Assistance sub-grants administered by the Bureau of Advocacy and Grants Management. Since FFY 2020-21, redirecting ancillary relocation costs to VOCA-Assistance and only considering interim shelter and housing needs ultimately led to the long-term sustainable budget solvency of the Crimes Compensation Trust Fund. By maintaining the cost savings measures for relocation assistance, the department was able to increase the amount offered for interim shelter and housing from \$1,000 to \$1,500 during FFY 2021-22, fostering a 27% increase in relocation assistance provided during FFY 2022-23.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation continues to maintain excellent rapport with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Attorney's Offices, and advocates affiliated with different branches of the armed forces by attending meetings, offering presentations, facilitating training, and working collaboratively in response to requests for compensation for crimes deemed federal jurisdiction. The department also responded to requests for information from the International Terrorism Victim Expense Reimbursement Program (ITVERP) to ensure there was no overlap in compensation.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation participated at learning opportunities provided by the National Criminal Justice Association's VOCA Center, including the Developing Victim/Survivor Centered Correspondence workshop held in Tampa, Florida, in February 2023. The information shared was used to create new templates that simplified complicated legal citations while delivering important information in a compassionate, nonjudgmental, and victim centric manner. The new Notice of Determination - Ineligible, Notice of Determination - Eligible, Request for Information, Special Notice of Insurance Waiver Provision, and Notice of Payment correspondences were implemented in August 2023.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation did not use federal Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) funds for administrative purposes during this reporting period. All administrative costs were paid using funds acquired through the state's Crime Compensation Trust Fund.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

No new or revised laws, administrative codes, or policy changes were implemented during this reporting period.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation continued its partnership with victim service organizations, sexual assault response teams, children advocacy programs, numerous state agencies, faith-based community representatives, and local law enforcement agencies to provide support and assistance with filing compensation claims.

Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

Public outreach is completed by offering continued education to victim advocates, service providers, law enforcement support staff, and community partners who engage victims of crime. The Bureau of Victim Compensation deployed a dedicated trainer to facilitate compensation discussions at Victim Services Practitioner Designation Training, Enhancing Victim Services Through Victim Compensation Training, and Florida Crisis Response Team Training which were offered multiple times throughout the state. The department also continued to publish posters offered in English, Spanish, and Creole, and brochures which were distributed at trainings and to Victim of Crime Act funded partners, as well as making them available to the public on our webpages at www.MyFloridaLegal.com and https://VANext.MyFloridaLegal.com.

All Division of Victim Services and Criminal Justice Program departments, which includes the Bureau of Victim Compensation, file an Annual Report with the Governor and Legislature.
